Power Outage Safety Tips

Carbon Monoxide (CO) Poisoning

Use of alternative sources of fuel or electricity for heating, cooling, or cooking during a power outage can result in CO build up.

- *Never use a generator, charcoal grill, hibachi, lantern, or portable camping stove inside a home, tent or camper.*
- *Place generators outside and at least 20 feet from doors, windows and vents.*
- *Always use a battery powered CO detector when using a generator.*



Heat and Cool Your Home Safely

- Never use a gas range or oven to heat a home.
- If conditions are too hot or too cold, seek shelter with friends or at a community shelter.



Food Safety

- Keep refrigerator and freezer doors closed as much as possible
- **THROW OUT**
 - all perishable foods in your **refrigerator** if the power is off for 4 hours or more.
 - all perishable foods in the **freezer** that have thawed.
- *You can re-freeze or cook frozen foods that still have ice crystals and feel as cold as if refrigerated.*

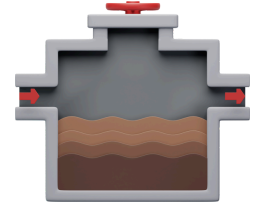


Protect Your Septic System from Damage Caused by Heavy Rains, Floods, or Other Emergencies

A well-maintained system can better withstand stresses like heavy rains or flooding.

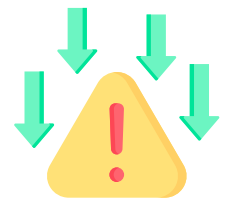
Before An Emergency

- Seal the manhole/inspection ports to keep excess water out of the septic tank.
- Be sure your septic tank is at least half full to prevent it from collapsing or floating.



During An Emergency

- Reduce the amount of water - limit toilet flushing, dishwashing, washing clothes, and showering.



After An Emergency

- Always avoid contact with any floodwater that may be contaminated with sewage— it can make you sick!
- Do not pump out the septic tank more than halfway or the tank may float out of the ground.
- Minimize nonessential water use.
- If you suspect septic system damage, get the system professionally inspected and serviced.
